Membership Memos:

Why is AAUW membership so important? Women in the United States are *still* not treated equally—not even close. Perhaps the most talked about discrepancy is the one in our paychecks. Women are typically paid 21 percent less than men. Even when we compare recent college graduates with the same major, in the same field, women are <u>still</u> paid less. And for women of color and moms, the numbers are even worse.

Over the next year we would like to give some examples of how women are still treated unequally. A poster with 79 examples was sent that some of you may have received. The first of which, of course, is the pay gap.

- 1. Women working full time are paid 79 cents to every dollar men working full time are paid.
- 2. Men directed 86 percent of all television episodes in 2013 and 2014.
- 3. Nearly two-thirds of bylines on-camera appearances and producer credits were listed to men, while women constituted only a third of these contributors.

- 4. Even among the top-grossing G-rated family films, girl characters are outnumbered by boy characters three to one.
- 5. Only 7 percent of directors, 13 percent of writers and 20 percent of producers are women.
- 6. In 2014, about 30 percent of TV news directors were women. While this is a very low number, it is actually a record high.
- 7. Only four women directors have been nominated for a directing Oscar.
- 8. Women are shown on air to report segments on foreign affairs and national security only 22 percent of the time.

Your membership is something that helps even the playing field for women and girls. We invite you to encourage others to join us to help break down these barriers.

Your support means a brighter future for our daughters and granddaughters. Together, for the sake of all women and girls, we MUST prevail.

Sometimes people aren't members because they have never been asked. Be brave, ask someone to join us!



AAUW Faribault Branch/Affiliate Meeting - Sept 26, 2016

The 2016-2017 Sept. board meeting of the Faribault AAUW was called to order by Pres. Pat Fuchs at 6:15 at South Central College. She welcomed members on behalf of herself and co-president Cyndy Harrison to an exciting year with informative programs,

fun social events and plannings for the 2018 state convention. Members were encouraged to take copies of the 2016 budget and tonight's agenda.

Reports:

- Secretary's report: Motion by Karen Rasmussen, second by Cyndy Harrison to approve the May 23, 2016 branch meeting minutes as printed. The motion carried.
- Treasurer's report was given on behalf of Julie Olson by Karen Rasmussen. We have \$181.50 in checking and \$5,040.53 in savings.
- Program: Gloria Olson distributed the tri-fold program brochures with the program descriptions, meeting dates, social activities and other events. Pres. Fuchs highlighted the plans for our coming year.
- Candidate forums: Pauline Schreiber reported on the forums: Oct. 6th the state legis-lature, Oct. 13th city council and mayor, and Oct. 20th- school board. Our October meeting will be held prior to the Oct. 20th forum at 6:00 p.m. in the public meeting room. Betty Harmsen and Donna Daleiden will be in charge of the technical work to broadcast live on FCTV. Publicity will be in the Faribault Daily News and also on KDHL. She passed around a green sign-up sheet for volunteers to help at each forum.
- Social Events: Kirsten Grunnet will be given time to describe the social events which she has organized. In addition to the ones listed in the program brochure, she is also trying to organize a viewing of "Hidden Figures" for January.
- Membership: Kathy Larson has new member bags ready to distribute and will introduce new members at our branch meeting. Karen Rasmussen has more cameo forms and has printed 6 more cameo booklets. She also showed the membership card which each member can print from the AAUW website.
- Scholarship: Karen Rasmussen announced that May 1st will be the deadline for the local scholarships and described the criteria and selection process used.
- Halloween Breakfast: An orange sign-up sheet was passed around during the meeting. We will pay for the food and not by the plate. Food will be ordered to accommodate 5% above the pre-sale tickets sold. Karen Rasmussen has applied for Thrivent Action Team money to help pay for the cost of the muffins and chocolate bars. There will also be kids' activities.
- Diversity: We participated in Faribault's International Festival in August. If there is inclement weather next year, and if it is to be held outdoors, we will not plan to participate.
- Environmental Issues: Roadside cleanup will be on Tues., Oct. 11th. Meet at 1:30 at the sign.
- Membership: Kathy Larson welcomed new members: Sharon Abbott, Kris Raaen, Kathryn Speulda, Carmen Tripp and Anne Wieber. She presented a welcome tote bag to our newest member, Carmen Tripp.

- 2018 Convention: Pat has tried to request a check list for our responsibilities in hosting the 2018 state convention but was unable to send email to the state AAUW president. Pat will send it to Cyndy to forward.
- Airport Field Renaming Project: Gloria Olson's report in the newsletter explained the progress, As soon as the renaming of the Faribault airport field to the Elizabeth Wall Strohfus Field is on the city council agenda, it will be approved.

New Business:

- The 2016-2017 budget was presented at the membership meeting by Pres. Pat Fuchs. Motion by Emily Nesvold, second by Pauline Schreiber to approve the 2016 - 2017 annual budget. The motion was approved.
- By Laws Changes: Due to an IRS ruling, we have to change any reference in our by-laws of "branch" to "affiliate" by January, 2017.
- New signage: Cyndy Harrison reported that a new portable sign and business cards could be ordered at a cost of \$200.00.
- Sunshine: Christy Dore will be responsible for sending cards to members.
- AAUW Yearbook and Directory: Pat Umbreit distributed the 2016-2017 directories.
