2018 Minnesota AAUW State Convention


An idea that sprouted two years ago is truly about to bloom! We are hosting the 2018 AAUW Minnesota State Convention next month! So many of you have already been working on making this


Social Time Coffee

Bylaws Amendment Vote

The AAUW Board of Directors has put three proposals for bylaws amendments before the



membership to

spring. Members will receive their voter PINs via email in April and with the spring AAUW Outlook magazine, which will be mailed to members without registered email addresses and to those that have requested to receive Outlook in the mail.

Members can comment on the proposed amendments and submit their own proposals from February 22, 2018, through March 22, 2018, at 11:59 p.m. ET.

Voting will open on April 25, 2018, and close June 9, 2018, at 9 p.m. ET.

The first two proposals would bring AAUW's board governance structure more in line with nationally accepted nonprofit best practices and the needs of the organization. The third proposal — to eliminate the degree requirement for membership — has come before the membership for vote a number of times. The board feels strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now perceived by many as counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

The board recognizes that we have not traditionally put proposals up for vote outside our AAUW National Election, but these proposed changes have been under consideration for several years by both the Governance Committee and the board, and we believe it is important to move forward without delay to position the organization for greater growth.

We encourage you all to engage in respectful debate that has always been a hallmark of the AAUW community, exercise your vote, and encourage fellow members to do the same.

We are at an ideal time to invite individuals to become members through the Shape-the-Future campaign! Starting March 16th, new (or those who haven't been members for two years or more) can join at the reduced rate of \$48.50 and membership will be good until June 30, 2019. Reminder that the national portion of our dues is increasing March 16th to \$59, so renewals will be \$78 going forward. It is still a really good value for the work that is being done for education and equity for women and girls.

Sometimes people aren't members because they have never been asked.

Marjory Stoneman Douglas, another remarkable woman who "nevertheless persisted"!

The students at the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School give me renewed hope for the future YO of this country. Their thoughtful, articulate and passionate activism about gun violence follows in the whe footsteps of the woman who bears the school's name. con She was born in Minneapolis in the 1890s but left when her father bought the Miami Herald, thus ale beginning her wide ranging lifetime of activism, livsta ing 108 years. She was involved in everything from e-n war refugees in World War I, women's suffragettes, civil rights, urban planning, sanitation issues, etc. The All last half of her life she fought real-estate developers, OC the Army Corps of Engineers, politicians and presibe dents to try to save the Everglades. She wrote "The re Everglades: River of Grass," which helped change to the perception of that region as a worthless swamp to a treasured and essential part of the ecosystem. I can't help feeling her smiling down on the students and giving them her blessing. A key quote of hers: "Be a nuisance where it counts, do your part to inform and stimulate the public to join your action. Be depressed, discouraged, and disappointed at failure and the disheartening effects of ignorance, greed, corruption and bad politics - but never give up." KAY MARTIN, Shorewood
