Secretary's Report

Aug. 7, 2023 Minutes of Board Planning Meeting

The Faribault AAUW Board met 10 a.m. Monday, Aug. 7 in Buckham Memorial Library's GreatHall. It was a meeting to plan the 2023-2024 budget and activities for the program year. Lead AAUW Co-President Carmen Tripp convened the planning session. Mary Niermann has agreed to assist Carmen by being co-president, and was at the meeting. Also present were: KathyLarson, membership V.P.; Liz

Hartman, AAUW Funds V.P.; Karen Rasmussen, co-membership V.P. and Scholarship Committee chair; Pauline Schreiber, secretary and program V.P.; and Past-President Pat Rice.

The group's first task was to go over the line items in the budget and to create a 2023-2024 budget to be voted on at the September branch meeting. JoEllen Schultz, treasurer, provided Carmen with a copy of the last two program year budgets to help in the process. JoEllen was unable to be at the August 7 meeting.

Carmen announced that Karen Ramussen is also now listed as a finance officer along with JoEllen Schulz. This enables Karen to submit membership dues and other financial information and to assist Kathy Larson with membership and JoEllen with her duties.

Pauline with be program V.P. in addition to serving as secretary. She agreed to that because there is a Program Committee whose members will help plan programs and contact potential speakers. Those on the committee with Schreiber are: Barb Dubbels, Betty Hamsen, Liz Hartman, Julie Olson and Gloria Olson.

Carmen indicated that we will need to vote on the 2023-2024 officers at the September meeting. Diane Hagen will continue as diversity V.P. She hoped that co-public policy V.P.s, Sue Willcutt and Sue Stout, will continue in that role.

Other highlights of the meeting:

* Membership booklet: It was discussed how to best update the members' information. Carmen will contact Pat Umbreit, Year Book editor, as to when she needs information for the booklet.

* Halloween Breakfast: Again, Karen Rasmussen and Kathy Larson will co-chair the event which will be on Sunday, Oct. 29 at the American Legion. A sign-up sheet for members who would like to help with the fundraiser will be passed around at the September meeting. After much discussion, it was decided tickets will be \$15 in advance and \$17 at the door, while childrens' tickets will remain at \$6. * Book sale. Pauline reported that she spoke to Pat Raftery, a member of the Friends of the Library, who had asked her during the May book sale if AAUW would be interested in partnering with the Friends of the Library, providing we decide to undertake a used book sale. Pat Raftery said the group's board had discussed having their own sale, but decided they would not have enough volunteers to organize and conduct one.

Although at the May branch business meeting members had agreed they could no longer do a book sale on their own, no formal vote was taken. Pauline suggested it be discussed again at the September meeting and a formal vote taken of the membership to decide the issue.

Carmen presented a letter from the Faribault Foundation she has received asking whether AAUW would participate in a new venture. A special board of women is being formed. Each member of the board would donate \$1,000 to the Foundation and then qualify to be a member of the board and help decide how the donated money is distributed to help organizations in the community. Members liked the idea that the new board would help women's' causes. However, Karen Rasmussen brought up the fact that AAUW By-Laws prohibit branches from donating to other non-profits. When asked in the past

to fund non-profit causes the hat has been passed. Carmen will bring it up at the September branch business meeting, but it is likely Faribault AAUW could not be represented on the board by donating \$1,000 to the Foundation's new board.

* It is Faribault AAUW's turn to host the Tri-Branch luncheon. We last did it in 2019 when the Buckham West expansion was new. Our member, Isabell O'Connor, provided a storytelling program for the event. It was catered by Arna Farmer and the Senior Center dining room was used for the meal. The Buckham West Commons area was used for the program. Barb Dubbels agreed to chair a Tri-Branch Luncheon Committee. Betty Harmsen, Julie Olson and Pauline Schreiber will be on the committee and at the September meeting other members interested in helping can sign up. The AAUW Board selected Saturday, April 20, 2024 as the day for the luncheon. The committee will determine the location, food and program. Our Branch Program for April will be the Tri-Branch Luncheon and no other meeting.

* Since many members do not like to drive at night, it was decided to try meetings on the fourth Monday of the month in the afternoon. The board meeting will be at 1:30 p.m.; the branch business meeting at 2 p.m. and the program at 2:30 p.m.

Branch business meetings will be at 2 p.m. and the program will begin at 2:30 p.m.


