pense I think we should cover in the future. We ended up with 400 orange and 100 green printed. Loved having a different color for at the door. Clipped the corner for children, marked them with a C.

☐ Thank you to those who turned in their presale money at the meeting prior, or at least a day before the breakfastthat was a super improvement! Never want to go back to collecting the day of the event. ☐ Thanks to Judy (Costco muffins) and Karen (placemats, napkins, coffee creamers, 400+ pieces of candies, and a ream of cardstock to make future flyers) for applying for Thrivent
cards Thanks to Gail Kielmeyer and her daughter Krista for pricing, bringing samples, and picking up the 50 cases of 6 muffins, 300 that were \$250 (Pumpkin streusel with caramel drizzle, dou-
ble choc, blueberry) Thanks to Carmen who applied to Kwik Trip to get extra muffins (5 dozen, 1 of each kind, individually wrapped).
☐ Thanks to Kathy for making signs and she and the Hartman's putting them out in the dark and picking them up. And all of Kathy's decorations for the table centerpieces! ☐ The SAL (Sons of American Legion did a super job making the omelets—guests raved how good they were! And they scooped up the extra 4 dozen muffins. ☐ The Legion Auxiliary benefited from the use of the tablecloths for the membership dinner the following evening, which they much appreciated. ☐ We served 320 adults and 3 children, actually 5 fewer than last year. They must have all come at one time as I heard we used all 28 tables. We had 300 presales, 61 adults and 2 kids bought tickets at the door. Our gross proceeds were \$5867, with the cash donations, etc. The Thrivent cards and Kwik Trip/Karen K donation gave us an additional \$600 for muffins, etc., etc.
On the flip side, The Faribault Daily News didn't run the article submitted, only brief of SAL omelets on Com. Calendar. We (Kathy and Karen) met with Misty to renegotiate the bill she had made up. Our food expenses are higher than they were last year, sigh, but seems inflation and delivery make the prices much higher. Our costs have gone up approx. \$200 each year from the year before. Bottom line, we made \$3459.32 (needs to be finalized by JoEllen), not quite the \$3500 budgeted, but better than we have previously done. I was bummed, hoping we would clear
\$4,000, but not this year. The breakfast is \$457.32 less income than the Book Sale was this year.
Questions to be talked about: Do we go to one price, no difference for presale or at the door? Presales help determine how many could potentially come and for Legion to order enough food. Can we raise the ticket price, especially if it's our only fundraiser? (\$18 or even \$20?) We offer extra amenities not at other omelet breakfasts that charge \$15, e.g., muffins, tablecloths, placemats, flavored coffee creamers, Halloween candy, and costumed servers. I think most of the people I talked to would do \$20, but it is a huge increase from the \$15 if that's all we consider. We don't have to decide right now, but I wanted to plant the thought. We can consider how the economy is doing, etc.

Secretary's Report

October 23, 2023 Business Meeting

Faribault AAUW Branch members met 2 p.m. Monday, Oct. 23, 2023 in the Carlander Program Room at the Rice County Historical Society. Lead Co-president Carmen Tripp convened the meeting with Jr. Co-president Mary Niermann beside her. Tripp first asked if there were any additions or corrections to the secretary's and treasurer's reports printed in the emailed Faribault AAUW October newsletter. Hearing none, they were accepted as printed.

New Business

Xmas Party

Program Committee member Julie Olson introduced an alternative idea for the annual

Christmas party. The idea, Olson said, was really that of Betty Harmsen, who was unable to come to the October meeting. Harmsen and Olson recently attended a Sertoma brunch meeting hosted at the Cathedral of Our Merciful Saviour. The women of the church provided the brunch for a price per person. Harmsen knew Faribault AAUW Branch will be meeting at the Cathedral on Monday, Dec. 18 for its Christmas Party and thought "Why can't AAUW have a meal, too, provided by the church women?" Olson said it would be a small fundraiser for the church women and allow members to come to the Christmas Party without having to bring a treat or appetizer, as had been the tradition in the past. The 21 AAUW members attending the meeting thought it a good idea. Emily Nesvold made a motion to allow the Cathedral church women to provide a catered brunch for \$12 a plate; Barb Dubbels seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Members, also, supported the Christmas Party starting at 12:30 p.m. instead of the 1:30 p.m. as printed in the Yearbook. Reservations and payment for the party will be made at the November meeting.

Koonmen Tree

Pat Rice introduced the idea of purchasing and planting a tree (likely next spring) in memory of long-time AAUW member Joan Koonmen. She passed away early this year. After a discussion, Rice made a motion to purchase and plant a tree somewhere on public property in Faribault. Liz Hartman seconded the motion. The motion carried. Rice and Hartman will work with Faribault Park and Recreation Director Paul Peanasky to find a location.

Old Business

Book Sale

Members have been discussing whether to have another book sale since the end of the 2023 sale in May. Another discussion occurred. This time, the consensus was to support one last book sale to sell those books stored in the basement of the Congregational Church's Parish House. Rice was strongly in favor of having one last book sale. Gloria Olson suggested having only a two-day sale rather than a protracted sale of six days as the

fundraiser has grown in length. Every year it has been harder and harder for members to work at it because we are all getting older and have physical ailments Liz Hartman said but she would be in favor of it if we would bill it to the public as our last one. Julie Olson and Barb Dubbels weren't in favor, at first, of holding another book sale. However, members talked the issue over, and if the sale is shortened up to two days, Olson and Dubbels supported having one last sale. Kathy Larson made the motion to hold a final sale, likely in the spring, and that the details of the sale will be worked out by the Book Sale Committee listed in the Yearbook. Mary Niermann seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Halloween Breakfast

Kathy Larson reported that she invited the three local scholarship winners to the Halloween

Breakfast. She hoped they would show up. Larson and her Halloween Breakfast Co-chair Karen Rasmussen reported that all is set for the 8 a.m. to noon omelet breakfast at the Faribault American Legion on Sunday, Oct.29, a fundraiser for local scholarships. Rasmussen collected money from members who sold pre-sale tickets. Oct. 23 was the deadline to sell pre-sale tickets. Over 200 pre-sale tickets have been sold, it appeared after Treasurer JoEllen Schultz helped Rasmussen tally the dollars collected. Not all members who took tickets to sell had attended the meeting. Those members will be contacted by Rasmussen.

Committee Reports

Membership VP Kathy Larson reported memberships up to around 40. Program VP Pauline Schreiber reported that at the November 27 meeting, a Silent Auction is again planned. Members can bring items they believe their fellow members will bid on. The dollars raised will go to a miscellaneous fund to pay for memorials for members who pass away or other expenses not in the regular budget. Nesvold will give the program that night on her trip to Palestine and Israel earlier this year.

After Tripp asked if there as any other business, and hearing none, Schreiber made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Nesvold seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Speaker

The program for the afternoon was Diversity and Discipline at Faribault High School. Barb

Dubbels introduced FHS Principal Joel Olson, who she had as an elementary student when she was still teaching, many years ago. Olson did a great job of describing how the FHS student body has changed since he attended the school. He is a 1987 graduate of FHS. He has been in education since 1997. He started as FHS principal on July 1, 2022, replacing Jamie Bente, who became Faribault Public Schools superintendent. The high school today is 50 percent non-white. It likely was 98 percent white when he attended. He told how both diversity and discipline are being addressed and efforts made to keep students on track.
