AAUW - Why Am I a member?

My first exposure to AAUW – Faribault Branch was at the MN Academy for the Deaf at the end of the 2003 Tour of Homes, the last year of the house tours. I met Gloria Olson and Carol Quail who were stationed there, and they explained some of what AAUW was. At the time it seemed it would be a good way to meet new people as I was new in town. I was working at The State Bank of Faribault but hadn't really gotten involved in anything, yet.

Most of the members are not native to Faribault. Many of us were perhaps drawn together to meet new people and make friendships. That has certainly been my case, and I have many friends in AAUW and lots of acquaintances. It also has satisfied another human desire: to make a difference. Whether it be as the Scholarship Chairman, Co-Chair of Halloween Breakfast, Branch Treasurer for seven years and now another stint, Co-President Jr and Sr, Co-Membership, Bylaws Chair, helping host the State Convention and so on all in same way has hopefully made a difference. It has taken me out of my comfort zone of being an introvert. My mother was active in her Extension Homemakers Club and later in other organizations, so I grew up knowing you belonged to an organization and actively participated.

I love to travel. One of my favorite memories of going to state conventions was a side activity in Winona of going to the Minnesota Marine Art Museum and seeing the exhibit of original masters such as Monet and Rembrandt. Other conventions I have attended, that I can remember, include St. Paul, Austin and Duluth. Other out of town ventures I have enjoyed have been to the History Theater in St. Paul and Tri-Branch luncheons in Northfield and Owatonna. Our social activities, which at one time included painting at the Upper East Side and jewelry making at Glass Garden Beads, now include quarterly birthday luncheons, coffee and treats at Janna's on the third Saturday, plus our annual Christmas at the Guild House and a picnic in May.

The monthly programs have given me a greater understanding of many topics. The candidates' forums have been insightful. Even where the events are held has broadened my experiences and knowledge. Creating the "Hats Off" booklet in 2015 for our 90th Birthday and the Cameo Booklet while I was president in 2015-16, were real learning experiences about my fellow members as well as doing things on the computer. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

"The Rice County Area United Way sponsors and administers Imagination Library in the Rice County area. The program is free to families of all income levels who live in these communities: Dundas, Dennison, LeCenter, Faribault, Lonsdale, Kilkenny, Montgomery, Morristown, Natrand, Northfield, Warsaw and Webster.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library helps families develop children's early literacy skills by providing free, high-quality books to children from shortly after birth until their fifth birthday

new, age-appropriate book arrives each month, addressed to the child. As children become old enough to understand, they are thrilled to get their monthly book in the mail.

Imagination Library is free to children, but only when caring adults donate. For \$30 a child, you can sponsor a year of books! For \$150 you can sponsor a child for all 5 years prior to kir dergarten!"

AAUW Funds

Minnesota is an AAUW Funds Star! Over the past 15 years, even as our Minnesota AAUW membership numbers have declined, branches and individuals have stepped up to support AAUW Funds. In fact, we have - amazingly! - increased our per capita contribution here in Minnesota from \$27 (per member) in 2010 to \$54 (per member) in 2023. Thanks for all your support of AAUW Funds and the great work we achieve together. Keep up the good work!

Treasurer's Report



Secretary's Report

The Faribault Branch of AAUW met at 2 p.m. Monday, Jan, 27, 2025, at the Rice County Historical Society, in its Carlander Program Room. The business meeting was conducted by President Mary Niermann. Her first item of business was the November Secretary's report printed in the December newsletter, and the November and January Treasurer's reports printed in the January newsletter. (There was no Business Meeting in December because of the Christmas Party and the celebration of Faribault AAUW's 100th Anniversary. Thus, no December Secretary's In the January newsletter. She asked for additions or corrections,

hearing none, she approved them as printed.

She, also, announced that instead "Branches", the units of AAUW are now to be called "Affiliates" of National AAUW.

Treasurer Karen Rasmussen gave an update on money from the Silent Auction held in December from what was reported in the January newsletter. She said additional money for items has been received and the new total for the auction is \$223.

Members discussed a suggestion by a member at the November meeting that Faribault AAUW give a donation to the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. The program encourages literacy by the gift of books to children. One member brought up the issue that it may be improper for one non-profit to give a donation to another non-profit, and the fact local AAUW fundraisers are advertised as being for scholarships. A collection of money from individual members willing to donate to the Imagination Library would be more appropriate. Another member, however, suggested the money raised at the December Silent Auction could be donated, since that money came from individual members. After a bit more discussion, Pat Rice made a motion that the Silent Auction money be rounded up to \$250 and that be donated to the Imagination Library as a one-time donation. JoEllen Schultz seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Rasmussen reported on a science fair she attended at Shattuck-St. Mary's School and theextremely sophisticated projects students reported on. She suggested that Faribault AAUW give a donation of \$500 to the program. There was no second. Several members thought there needed to be more research into whether there is a need for donations to the program or if it is already well funded. The issue was tabled until more research is done.

Liz Hartman, co-newsletter editor, made a plea for more "Legacy Letters" from members on the value of AAUW in their lives for the next newsletter.

Niermann announced that the Tri-Branch Luncheon will be in Owatonna in April, but she has not received the details yet.

Pauline Schreiber reported that the 2025 State AAUW Convention will be April 25 and 26 in Austin. The banquet will be at the Austin Country Club the night of April 25 and the Business Meeting and Programs will be on April 26 at the Hormel institute for Cancer Research. Schreiber made a motion to adjourn; Schultz seconded the motion. The motion passed. The speaker for the meeting was Faribault City Administrator Jessica Kinser who spoke of her background and the challenges of her job.
