
This month looks to be another interesting program.

Thanks to those who were able to attend the Shattuck event this week. I'd like to hear about it.


I hope that you were able to read and respond to the email from Shannon Wolfe on dues increases and Governance Proposals.

Your legacy with Faribault AAUW matters. Those of use who attended Marjorie O'Loughlin's workshop in late October thought, since this is our 100th Anniversary Year, that members who wished could write and submit a Legacy Letter to the newsletter, as to why they have been a member of AAUW, or on a special memory from their years as members.

A Legacy Letter is written to a relative on a subject you would like to pass on to them such as your life story, values, what you have learned in your life, or reflection on some other aspect of your experiences. Below is Pauline Schreiber's reflection as to why she has stayed a member of the Faribault AAUW Branch for close to 50 years. She joined in 1976. This was written during the October workshop.

"AAUW in one word, 'connectedness'.

As women, we have faced challenges for being born female. AAUW connects women locally, statewide and nationally to work together to make a difference such as working to pass Title IX and other legislation to benefit women and girls.

I have stayed a member of AAUW because of the close friendships I have made with my fellow

members. Through the years we have worked together to make a difference. We raised money for local scholarships as well as national AAUW fellowships the Legal Advocacy Fund. At one time, we put on a "Connecting Girls to Work" event during spring break that linked girls to women in different professions in town.

I've attended many state AAUW conventions in different cities around Minnesota in my years in AAUW. Those events have connected me with other AAUW members from around the state. I have learned that the concerns women have are universal. We want young people to thrive, boys as well as girls, and we want discrimination against not just women and girls, but minorities and others to end so everyone lives in a more equal and peaceful society."

Our current bank balance is \$14,139.74.


Our contribution for AAUW Funds for 2024 was sent prior to the mid-Dec deadline: \$1500 for the Greatest Needs Funds.

Kinser will speak on the "Challenges of Local Leadership" and her experiences in leading the City of Faribault since April 1, 2024.

She is the city's first woman city administrator.

Kinser studied English and political science at Iowa State University, as well as public administration in graduate school. She, then, worked as a management and financial analyst at the county level for three years.

Kinser got her start in city administration in a small city of 1,000, Griswold, lowa, which is 20 miles south of the city she grew up in, Walnut, an even smaller city. A few years later, she took the job of

finance director for Clinton, Iowa, a town of 26,000.

She was hired in April to replace former city administrator Tim Murray who retired.
