Tri-Branch Luncheon

Thanks to Karen Rasmussen for some pictures from yesterday's (April 12) Tri-Branch Luncheon at the Owatonna Art Center. She and I are adding a few notes from the event. Sixteen members and a guest attended from Faribault. It was fun to see our long-time member, Shelly Rockman, who lives in Owatonna and was helping to greet guests. Karen wanted to get us all together for a group photo, but in the bustling dining room that would have been akin to herding cats. The Art Cener is such a great venue and yesterday with the large stained-glass windows and fresh flowers everywhere, it looked stunning. They had real silver for eating (including 3 forks) and a silver teapot at each table, sat on a piece of Somali fabric and held a bouquet of fresh flowers. One of the carafes on the table had a yellow ribbon which indicated it was Somali tea, a sweet tea much like our chai tea. I thought cloves was the dominant spice, some thought cardamon. I don't know why we didn't ask the three Somali women at the next table. An opportunity for communication lost.

It was fun to visit with people from Owatonna and Northfield, but we were so sad to hear that the Northfield Branch is disbanding. They too just celebrated their 100-year anniversary and felt grateful to have reached that landmark.

Dr Hudda Ibrahim, St. Cloud, our warm and dynamic speaker shared so much information on Somalia and its people (culture, religion, language, etc.) plus the experiences of recent Somali immigrants to Minnesota. The greatest number of Somalis in the US live in Minnesota. She told about The Dine and Dialogue program that she and her husband started in St Cloud to help people in the community get to know their Somali neighbors. You can Google

Faribault AAUW Branch Meeting

MARCH 24, 2025 MINUTES

The Faribault Branch of AAUW held it March business meeting at 2 p.m. in the Carlander Program Room at the Rice County Historical Society. President Mary Niermann greeted members and brought the meeting to order. Niermann's first order of business was approval of the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports for the February meeting. Both were included in the emailed monthly newsletter. Hearing no additions or corrections, she deemed both approved as written.

Next on the agenda was electing delegates to the April 25-26 State AAUW Convention in Austin. A motion was made and seconded to elect Karen Rasmussen, Pat Rice, JoEllen Schultz and Pauline Schreiber as delegates. The motion passed. Liz Hartman and Mary Niermann are thinking of going, and if they do, would be assigned alternate delegates.

Pauline Schreiber brought an envelope addressed to Owatonna AAUW for the April 12 Tri-Branch Luncheon. She collected money from five individuals. At the March 20 AAUW Book Club, Barb Dubbels collected nine checks. A number of members have sent in check on their own so Faribault AAUW should have a good showing at the event that will be held at the Owatonna Art Center with Torey's Restaurant catering the food. The speaker is Hudda Ibrahim, a St. Cloud City Council member and educator at St. Cloud Technical and Community College. She has written the book, "From Somalia to Snow."

Niermann asked about the "Women in History Month" article published in the Faribault Daily News. Schreiber wrote the first one on the founding of Faribault AAUW 100 years ago and general history about National AAUW which ran March 6; Kathryn Speudla interviewed 50-year member Pat Rice and her article ran March 13; Pat Rice interviewed 50-year member Liz Hartman and her article ran

March 20; Gloria Olson wrote the fourth article on Faribault AAUW local scholarships that should run before March is over.

A National AAUW webinar on fundraising is scheduled for April 1. AAUW Funds V.P. Liz Harman and Membership V.P. Kathy Larson, with the help of Karen Rasmussen, handled an interview, proving information n Faribault AAUW's funding raising, that will be part of the webinar.

Hartman collected items for the Branch's wine basket for the silent auction at the Austin State Convention.

SPRING PICNIC

Niermann asked about the Spring Picnic. Schreiber reported that Arna Farmer will be catering it again. She asked if members wanted a change in the menu and if they would be willing to pay \$20 a piece for the meal. Members liked the past menu and said they would be willing to pay \$20 a piece.
