# Minutes From The September 22 2025AAUW Business Meeting

Members of Faribault AAUW met at 2:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 22 in the Carlander Room at the Rice County Historical Society.

President JoEllen Schultz greeted members and brought the meeting to order.

Schultz's first item of business was approval of the Secretary's and Treasurer's reports for the May meeting. Both were included in the emailed monthly newsletter. Hearing no additions or corrections, she deemed both approved as written.

Next on the agenda was the election of officers. The slate was introduced in May. The 2025-2026 officers were listed in the new Yearbook passed out to members by Yearbook Editor Pat Umbreit. Schultz thanked her for her efforts to produce the Yearbook by the September meeting. Pat Rice made a motion to approve the slate of officers; Kathryn Speulda seconded the motion. The motion carried. Officers are: Schultz, president; Pauline Schreiber, program V.P. and secretary; Karen Rasmussen, treasurer Kathy Larson, membership V.P.; Liz Hartman, AAUW Funds V.P.; Sue Willcutt and Sue Stout, co-V.P.'s of public policy; Diane Hagan, diversity V.P.; Julie Olson has agreed to be auditor, a non-elective position, Schultz said, and Rasmussen will continue as bylaws chair. Rasmussen will, also, continue to chair the scholarship committee.

Schultz told members that photographs of the two 2025 \$1,500 scholarship winners were printed in the Faribault Daily News. They are: Sadie Kern and Evy Vettrus. Kern is attending the UM-Rochester with aspirations of becoming a physician's assistant. Vettrus attends Minnesota State University-Mankato with hopes of one day being a commercial pilot.

#### **Tri-Branch Luncheon**

Schultz had Schreiber report on the Tri-Branch Luncheon and why Faribault will be hosting it just two years after hosting it in 2024. She reported that with the Northfield AAUW Branch disbanded. The Faribault Branch had been contacted by the Owatonna Branch as to whether or not we would be hosting the program this year. Schreiber reported that the plan, devised at the Faribault Branch Planning Meeting for the 2025-2026 year, is for Faribault to host the event on Saturday, April 18, 2026, at a location to be determined.

Faribault AAUW will invite both the Hastings and Austin Branch to the event with the hope that one or both might join in the luncheon rotation. Faribault AAUW member Cheryl Freund has agreed to give a program on "The Women of Shakespeare." What is needed is a committee to plan where the event will take place and other details of the event. Liz Hartman, while not at the meeting, has agreed to be on the committee with Schreiber. She asked for other volunteers. Pat Rice and Kathy Larson volunteered to be on the Tri-Branch Luncheon Committee with Hartman and Schreiber.

Schreiber, also, went over the programs for the year that are listed in the 2025-2026 Yearbook.

#### Membership

Larson said she is still trying to collect membership dues from some past members. Overall, membership is down from last year. There are 40 members listed in the Yearbook.

#### **Budget**

Rasmussen passed out copies of the proposed 2025-2026 Budget, and then went over it in detail. The total expenses for the year are proposed to be \$6,156. After a discussion, Larson made a motion to approve the budget; Gail Kielmeyer seconded the motion. The motion carried.

A second motion was made by Rasmussen, and seconded by Mary Niermann, to approve a policy that members would pay in advance for catered meals at special events such as the Christmas Party and Spring Picnic. No member would be considered registered for the event unless paid ahead of time. The policy is to make sure the group would not have to pay for those who call and register with the intent of paying for a meal at the door and not showing up. The motion carried.

#### Halloween Breakfast

Larson and Rasmussen, co-Halloween Breakfast chairs, reported to members that the Halloween Breakfast Fundraiser will be Sunday, October 26, 8 a.m. to noon, at the Faribault American Legion. Tickets will be \$15 for adults in advance and \$18 at the door. Children's tickets will continue to be \$6. The ticket prices are a few dollars less than last year. Larson said, this is because the American Legion is giving Faribault AAUW a better deal on food costs." Barb Dubbels, who donates the cost of printing the tickets, packaged them in units of 10 and members could pick up a package or two and record their names with the ticket numbers they took. Pre-sale tickets can be sold until Oct. 16 after which time members should report to Rasmussen how many pre-sale tickets they sold.

#### **Program**

Speaker for the afternoon was Kiran Lowenstein, RCHS's education and outreach director, who spoke on Sacajawea. Lowenstein spent an internship in Salmon, Idaho at the Sacajawea Interpretive Center. She talked about the facts known about Sacajawea, an Indian guide and interpreter with the Lewis and Clark Expedition, who was instrumental in making the journey a success, versus the myths about the Shoshone Indian woman. Sacakawea was the only woman on the expedition and had an infant son. Submitted by Secretary Pauline Schreiber
